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# IN THE SPOTLIGHT: FRANK KRAETZ

Pierre DeAngelo Young deserves credit for providing us with incredible "tribute like" insight into what makes the subject of this month's In the Spotlight, **Frank Kraetz**, such a gifted leader and mentor here at CNI College. His life story is both interesting and inspirational and one we're sure you'll all enjoy.

Frank was born at St. Joseph's Hospital and likes to joke that he just crawled across the 22 freeway in order to come teach at CNI. He has always known the love and support of his two parents - his ultimate role models who encouraged him to follow his heart and his dreams, whatever they might be, and gave him the unconditional love to do so. Though he likes to joke that he was a happy only-child for 9 years, he has been blessed with two younger sisters, Katherine and Lora. Katherine works as a Certified Nursing Assistant and Lora as a second grade teacher, so the bug for both medicine and teaching apparently runs in the family.

As a child, science was one of his favorite subjects because he was so intrigued by learning about the way the world works. He initially aspired to be a filmmaker and even checked out film school at UCLA. However, after a seminar that his pastor did on finding your purpose in life it occurred to him that he could help more people by a career in the medical field – the interest for which was sparked by reading through medical journals his father brought home from his second job. It was initially like trying to read Chinese for him, but he was magically intrigued and vowed someday to be able to understand the enigmatic tomes. Frank also one gave thought to becoming a medical illustrator because he also loved art, however he hadn't really pursued this seriously since winning an award in first grade. Furthermore, he found that his desire to really interact with others lead him to want to become a physician.

Pursuing his goals early on, he volunteered at a hospital as a teenager and took a course for adults in medical terminology for anatomy and physiology over the summer when he was 16 years old. When a medical assistant course failed to provide him with any viable job prospects of working with blood and guts, he decided to join the Navy Reserve at age 22. Although he was considered a Corpsman, he was trained at a civilian school in surgical technology at Long Beach Paramedical and Technical College, the only vocational school around at that time. Frank's initial intention was to work as a surgical technologist to gain practical experience in the medical field and as a means of financial support for college on the path towards medical school.

During his undergraduate studies in pre-medicine, he took a mandatory introductory course in psychology and became so fascinated with the subject matter that he voluntarily took a succession of other courses related to psychology and sociology. Frank's interests progressively grew, and he chose psychology as his minor emphasis. As a surgical technologist, he thrived on the challenges of surgery, working collaboratively as part of a team of medical professionals knowing full well that he was contributing to the patient's welfare in a meaningful way. However, he came to realize that his passion had more to do with the miracle of the human body than the practice of medicine. He understood that a commitment to become a physician required a

love of medicine; consequently, he considered the alternative career of becoming a psychologist.

When he transferred to upper division at California State University Long Beach, he chose psychology as his major. He enjoyed gaining insight into himself both interpersonally and in relation to others, as well as understanding people in a more dynamic manner. He was interested in learning what makes us who we are and why we do what we do. Given that he worked his way through undergraduate studies out of necessity, he needed a change of pace before delving into graduate school. Upon discovering a foreign work program, he moved to Japan to teach English for a year. Living in a new country and contending with a foreign language and culture were sometimes difficult but always exciting challenges. As a result of this adventure, he gained an experiential knowledge of what it means to be a stranger in a strange land, which deepened his appreciation and empathy for others in similar predicaments. Following this, he attended the Rosemead School of Psychology at Biola University because of the high quality of the faculty, the didactic experiences offered, and the numerous clinical training opportunities available in the Los Angeles-Orange County area.

Frank has always been curious and enjoyed new discoveries, and considers himself to be an eternal student of life. He enjoyed teaching, whether didactically or clinically and believes one of the best ways to learn something is to teach it to someone else. Even prior to teaching English in Japan, his initial experience began early in his medical career as a lead surgical technologist where he was responsible for being a preceptor and indoctrinating new employees. After working in the field for a number of years, he was finally afforded an opportunity to be an educator at an adult vocational school teaching anatomy and physiology, surgical principles, operative procedures, and laboratory skills. Frank remembered how influential his instructors were for him and has been proud to contribute towards the welfare of others who are improving their lives through a new career.

In addition to working in the field of surgical technology, Frank had the opportunity to teach psychology courses at Biola University, Azusa University, a Korean international school in Anaheim, and at Daystar University in Kenya, Africa, where he lived for a summer. There is an old adage in the medical field that he has always followed: "See one, do one, teach one." He believes that working as a surgical technologist necessarily involves teaching neophytes in the field to pass along the knowledge and experiences that he has benefited from while scrubbing. "Just like with scrubbing in the OR and teaching students at CNI, working with clients in the practice of psychology enables me numerous opportunities to be challenged to learn and grow." The role of a therapist, in comparison to that of a physician, has the added advantage for developing deeper, more meaningful relationships with clients, which is something he highly values in working with students as well. Frank strives to be the best he can be and I am glad to call him my "friend."

Frank, who received his PhD in Psychology last year is affectionately known as "Dr. Frank" and has been with CNI College for the past two years. He can teach all subjects in Surgical Technology and his happiness and passion for teaching and life shows through in all he does. A "can do" person, he is a professional with a perpetually positive attitude.
